Weather Reminder

Over the winter months if the schools are closed (primarily Reeds Spring, Blue Eye, and Branson), then the Gallery will be closed and the Guild meeting will be cancelled. Use your best judgment for safety.

Thanks to Josie Roetto for sharing the introduction to her book about the Island she lives on in Alaska and her experience with eagles as neighbors.

Eagles

Eagle Island takes its name from its residents (inhabitants), a nesting pair of American Bald Eagles. There are two nests located on the upper half of the island in champion¹ size cottonwood trees - the largest tree having a circumference of over 17 feet - and the eagles alternate using them from year to year. In winter, snow, high winds and ice storms damage the nests and the pair decides which one to rebuild. We don't know how they make the choice. They raise two and occasionally three eaglets every summer, which provides unlimited opportunities for us, the human nesting pair who also live there, to observe every stage of their development, from the first hairy head bobbing on the crest to flapping wings and edge roosting. The eaglets are fed a diet rich in protein, coming from a local abundance of fish, fur and fowl, and quickly reach adult size.

Eagles are very vocal and seem to have a call for every circumstance. Hearing their daily chatter and bantering, complete with crying babies, is a matter-of-fact daily occurrence on the Island, and a constant reminder of their enchanting magic and specialness.



August signals "fly-time" and gradually, by mid-month, the eaglets are starved off the nest by the parents. The process is not easy and they are very reluctant to move from their safe, comfort zone, but when the food supply drops to nothing they mature pretty fast. Like spoiled kids, they create quite a stir with endless whining and fanfare, but finally start to move, unsteadily perching on adjacent branches, fledging, and finally - first - albeit clumsy - flight. Flying is intuitive. Takeoffs and landings are a big challenge, and, until they develop depth perception, find them particularly difficult to negotiate. Predictably, first landings are rough, they crash into the river banks or comically skid and drop-roll on the gravel bar and just as often, misjudge a landing in the dense branches of a spruce or cottonwood tree, in which case, they fumble around until they figure out how to flex both wings for lift off. Also, since August is usually a rainy season, another crisis

often occurs when they first encounter a soaking rain stormwet feathers, and the long wait to dry out. Occasionally they'll end up in the clearing around our cabin, on the picnic table, at the fire pit, or even on our roof. When this happens they are profoundly stunned, act wary, and noiselessly stay until they get their bearings, and then, left alone, take clumsy flight. Finally, by summers' end they soar, free and easy, on the thermals high above.

The parents, ever vigilant, watch patiently, perched in adjoining trees, acting as silent and stoic sentries, there to protect and offer encouragement until instinct shows the way.

One year, an eagle bathed each evening, in the long shadows of western sun, on a gravel bar viewable from my kitchen windows. I watched her and passed my time cooking and cleaning up as she performed a ritual of fluffing and splashing in the rivers' shallow gravel edge and then hopping to perch on a nearby piece of driftwood, where she fanned her feathers to dry. I thought surely this was her respite, after a long day of hunting and tending babies in the nest. I came to think of her as a friend and that this was "our" time....

A native of Sarita, Texas, Mary grew up on a large South Texas ranch. She spent most of her professional life in the world of finance and banking in San Antonio, where she lived from 1973 until 1994.

She began painting in Florida in 2002, during a time of illness, using art as therapy at the suggestion of her friends. Her first experiences were with oils, and she now paints in both oils and acrylics.

In 2003 she moved to South Padre Island, Texas to be closer to her parents. She had a very busy career in real estate until 2011.

In the midst of breast cancer treatments in 2011 and 2012, Mary relocated to Rockport, Texas. She owned and operated Rockport Gallery until early 2017 when she moved to Kimberling City, Missouri to be closer to her son Kirk and his family who live in Branson West.

In addition to being recently elected as Treasurer for TRAG, she is on the Board of Schooner Bay Landing where she serves as Treasurer. She also cares for her grandchildren several times each week. She enjoys her retirement and describes this time in her life as the best ever.

She is best known for her realistic paintings of Gulf Coast game fish, including Tarpon, Marlin, Trout, Redfish, Flounder and Black Drum. She paints only one or two fish per year, and a tremendous amount of research and study goes into each one. Originals are typically 48"x24" in order to capture accurate details. She also produces individually signed prints on canvas and paper in various sizes.
