Art can provide solitude in quarantine... It's okay to be worried about the pandemic, but it's also important to take a break and not let that worry and anxiety consume you. Live the moment- that's what art is here for, and who better to learn from than the masters and mentors who inspire you and you would like to learn more about.

Artist must always pursue new ideas, or clever ways to present old ideas. What better way to do this than apply what you have learned from the work of others.

Analyze what it is you respond to in other works, just as you analyze what you like in a particular painting of your own.

Even though your work may not look like theirs, nonetheless they've been influences you have learned from.

Do research on the artist you have chosen, materials used, methods of work and the history of the painting itself.

Study the ways different artists have interpreted their subjects. Some paint simply, others with great detail. Some use neutrals and others use pure color. By acquainting ourselves with a variety of styles you will come to know your own.

Which one to tackle? Very simply paint, draw, sculpt, carve or photograph whatever interests you, no matter how ambitious or difficult it seems, whether the whole picture or just a part. Figure out what it is about a particular artist that intrigues you and set about to uncover his secret.

Consider the artists choice of subject matter.

Study format and composition. Study how light is used. Study artist who are dealing with the same problems that you are trying to solve.
